Children's Dental Health exhibits in New Orleans, Kenner

Children's Dental Health Month is underway!

One of the premier public service programs of NODA, the month-long event actually was scheduled to begin January 26 with a half-day seminar for school nurses and teachers at LSU Dental School.

Dr. Gizelle Richard was chairman of the teacher event.

A citywide "brush-in" by third grade students was scheduled February 1, the same day that major dental care exhibits opened at the Louisiana Children's Museum, 428 Julia St. in New Orleans, and the new Freeport McMoRan Daily Living Science Center, 409 Williams Blvd. in Kenner.

NODA's Auxiliary, LSU Dental School students and dental hygiene students, and related groups are cooperating in staffing the two exhibits. Dr. Sam Miano, general chairman, also urged dentists to sign up their offices for a day of staffing the exhibits.

Hours at the Children's Museum are 9:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. every day except Monday. Hours at the Kenner Center are 9-5 Tuesday through Saturday and 1-5 on Sundays.

John Fourcade, New Orleans Saints quarterback, is honorary chairman of the event which covers New Orleans and six surrounding parishes.

Some lucky family of four will win a trip to Disney World in NODA's Disney World Sweepstakes which got underway last month.

Entry forms were printed in the January issue of *NODA News*. NODA members are asked to photocopy as many forms as they wish and distribute to patients, prospective patients and the general public.

Dr. Miano said the "Dentists with a Heart" program and the NODA Disney World Sweepstakes are projects running concurrently with Children's Dental Health Month.

A number of dentists have volunteered to appear on radio and television programs arranged by Fitzgerald, NODA's public relations firm. Mayor Barthelemy of New Orleans and Mayor Aaron Broussard issued proclamations. Another feature of the observance is the "Adopt a School" program in which dentists are to make appearances at schools near their offices.

Kentwood Spring Water, Crest toothpaste, and Criminal Sheriff Foti's office are among the groups supporting the month-long observance.

CPR guidelines are altered

Because of concerns about infection control, new national guidelines say laymen can skip the mouth-to-mouth phase of cardiopulmonary resuscitation to avoid possible transmission of the AIDS virus from victim to rescuer or vice versa.

The guidelines, issued by a committee of the American Heart Association and published in *JAMA*, update previous CPR recommendations issued in 1985 by suggesting that anyone attempting CPR should first try compressing the victim's chest before resorting to blowing air into the person's mouth.

The guidelines emphasize that there are no known cases in which the AIDS virus has been transmitted through CPR. But they note that "a theoretical risk" of transmission does exist.

Such a risk would be greatest if either the rescuer or the victim had a cut in or around the lips or mouth, or other injuries that could result in exchange of blood during mouth-to-mouth resuscitation.

DENTISTS WITH A HEART
"Dentists with a Heart Day" will be observed on Valentine's Day, Wednesday, February 14, in conjunction with Children's Dental Health Month.

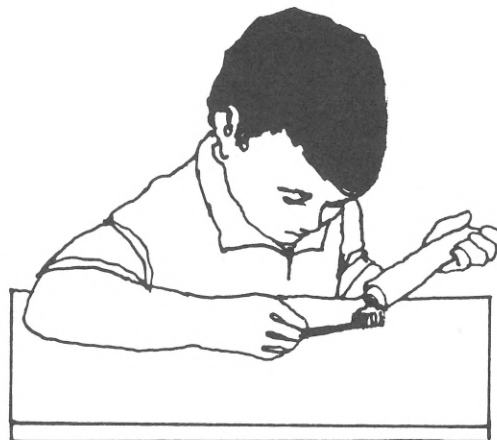
Dr. Vincent Liberto, chairman, said approximately 50 dental offices have volunteered to see children on that day who are unable to pay for dental services. Patients will be limited to children whose families do not qualify for federal aid or who are not currently under treatment in a dental office.

CELEBRITIES FOR DENTAL HEALTH

When Saints quarterback John Fourcade accepted the honorary chairmanship of Children's Dental Health Month, he joined a lengthy list of stars who have held the title.

Among them are Jake Kupp, Archie Manning, Pete Fountain, the late Pete Maravich and Gail Goodrich of the New Orleans Jazz, Bobby Hebert, Cap'n Sam of TV fame and Ronald McDonald.

CONFERENCE DRAWS FROM FAR AND WIDE

The reputation of the New Orleans Dental Conference goes far beyond New Orleans and Louisiana. Did you know that 39 states, including Hawaii, were represented by attendees at the 1989 Conference?

There were 11 participants from California and 17 from Illinois, although the Conference does not advertise in those states and doesn't advertise as much as some conferences.

DID YOU KNOW?

• The July 1989 Centennial Edition of the *Wall Street Journal* reported that dentists were second only to teachers as the most respected among professions.

• The number of female graduates from dental schools has almost doubled over the last 10 years from 634 in 1979 to 1,263 in 1988, according to the ADA's Department of Membership Services.

• *Dental Economics* reports that 35.3 percent of dentists surveyed currently advertise, 1.9 percent may advertise in the future, 1 percent will do so if the majority do, and 61 percent do not advertise.

• Dentists topped a recent Gallup poll in which Americans rated eight different service providers. In the May survey, 1,000 American heads-of-households were asked to rate eight service providers on a 1 to 5 scale (5 being excellent, 1 being poor). Seventy percent of those surveyed gave dentists a 4 or 5, making them the highest-rated service providers in the group. The average rating for dentists was 3.97.

Physicians rated an average of 3.57, banks 3.62, telephone companies 3.77, public utilities 3.70, insurance companies, 3.49, hospitals 3.46 and airlines 3.36.

An interesting finding was that dentists' ratings increased as the income of survey respondents rose. For example, 66 percent of those surveyed with incomes under \$20,000 gave dentists a 4 or 5 rating, compared to 73 percent of those with incomes of \$75,000 or more. This did not hold true with physicians.

DENTAL FEARS

American Health's May 1989 lists reasons why people fear a visit to the dentist. Not surprisingly, the drill and injections rate high on the list, but new studies point to other reasons:

- making an appointment
- losing control
- getting teeth cleaned
- choking or gagging
- dentists who won't listen or who ignore requests
- criticisms or insults about personal oral health
- extractions
- post-treatment swelling

SACRED TOOTH OF BUDDHA

One of the most sacred religious relics in the world is the tooth of Buddha. The tooth is enshrined at the Dalada Miligawa, or Temple of the Tooth, in Kandy, Sri Lanka, considered the most holy site of the Buddhist religion.

According to Dr. Malvin O. Ring's *Dentistry: An Illustrated History*, a disciple of Buddha extracted a tooth from the religious leader's body before it was consumed in fire about 483 B.C. The disciple took the tooth to the town of Kalinga, which would become known as Dantapura, or town of the tooth.

Throughout the years, the tooth was captured and taken to India, recaptured and returned to Sri Lanka, and hidden in various parts of the island to prevent its destruction. Finally, in 1560, it was taken by Portuguese soldiers and burned in Goa, India, in the presence of the Indian governor and members of his court.

Today, a new tooth carved out of ivory is enshrined in the temple in Kandy. The substitute tooth continues to serve as an important part of the Buddhist religion.

Once each year, the Festival of the Sacred Tooth occurs with great fanfare. According to Dr. Ring's description, "An elephant clad in scales of shimmering gold parades down paths strewn with rose petals, with a golden casket on his back containing the revered relic, while hundreds of thousands of devout pilgrims bow in worship."

Speaking at the American Dental Association's annual meeting, Marvin Berman of Chicago said that children pick up on a parent's apprehension and "if we're all in the treatment area together, the child will take direction from the parent, not the dentist. It becomes two against one."

NODA PROFILE

Dr. Peterson: Practitioner, Civic Leader, Outdoorsman

When it comes to careers in dentistry, it would be hard to top Don Peterson. He's packed in enough accomplishment and excitement for three lifetimes.

Dr. Peterson's list of honors and achievements is lengthy. There's still another title he could lay claim to: dean of the Maison Blanche Building, once the mecca of New Orleans dentistry and medicine. He's had an office there for an astonishing 58 years!

"At one time we had between 150 and 175 dentists and physicians in this building," Dr. Peterson recalls. "Dr. C. Edmund Kells, the famed dentist and radiologist, had an office here."

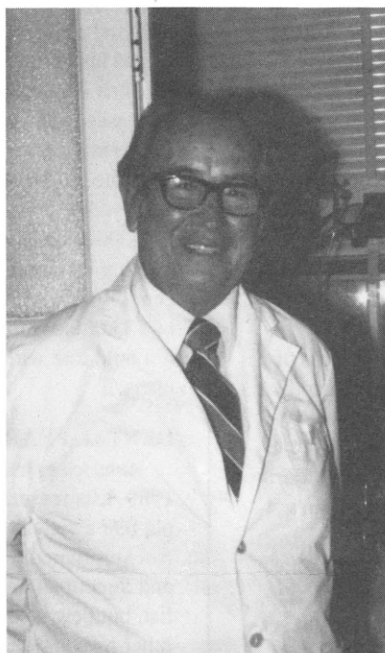
The gentlemanly, soft-spoken New Orleans dentist has reached the pinnacle in a number of fields, some of which have brought him into contact with noted Louisiana figures.

He was a member of the board of directors of Charity Hospital of Louisiana for 16 years under three governors, serving as chairman from 1956-1960 and again from 1964-1972. (He qualifies his title as officially vice-chairman since the Governor of the State was ex-officio chairman.) He was the first dentist in Louisiana history to hold this post.

Gov. Earl K. Long was his patient. Another patient and close friend was United States Congressman F. Edward Hebert.

In fact, it is not generally known that Dr. Peterson was an important link between organized dentistry and the U.S. Congress back in the 50's and 60's. "The ADA called me virtually non-stop in those days asking me to bring important dental issues to the attention of Congressman Hebert, a powerful force in Washington," says Dr. Peterson. "I did what I could."

Dr. Peterson is a 1932 graduate of the Loyola University School of Den-

istry where he was a member of OKU and Blue Key, national honor fraternities. He immediately went into practice in the MB Building with another renowned dentist, the late Dr. Charles Rossner. Dr. Peterson also became an instructor and later assistant professor at the Loyola Dental School, a position he held for 37 years, until the school's closing in 1969, whereupon LSUSD appointed him associate clinical professor of maxillofacial surgery. He is a Fellow of the American College of Dentists and served as chairman of the faculty board of Loyola's dental hygiene department.

Throughout his distinguished career he has been a leader in promoting the health of the community. He was a board member and secretary of Health Education Authority of Louisiana, known as HEAL, which brought about significant improvement in area medical facilities.

He has been a dental consultant to EENT Hospital, dental associate at Southern Baptist Hospital and dental consultant to the LSU division of Charity. The Orleans Parish Medical Society made him an associate member. He served two terms as president of the Cancer Association of Greater New Orleans and received a plaque recently naming him a lifetime board member.

Dr. Peterson, a founding board member of the New Orleans Dental Conference, has seen many changes in dentistry. One of these is the emergence of women in the profession.

"I had my doubts at first about women as operators," he admits, "but no more. In fact, my own dentist is a woman, Dr. Darlene Bassett."

Boats, fishing and the outdoor life have long been close to the heart of Dr. Peterson. He has been a board member of the Grand Isle International Tarpon Rodeo for 40 years, served as its president in 1956 and has been general chairman since 1972.

A senior life member of the Southern Yacht Club, he sailed on two ocean races. A founding member of the New Orleans Big Game Fishing Club, he held the record for seven years for largest white marlin and in 1975 also caught the largest blue marlin. "I have a small boat now and do most of my fishing on inside waters," he says.

He has been named as honorary life member of the famed Tally-Ho Club, the nation's oldest hunting and fishing clubs.

Dr. Peterson has been married for 38 years to the former Mary Alma Bishop. They are justly proud of their son, Dr. Don Peterson, Jr., a physician practicing family medicine near Tampa, Florida.

Don't allow your anxiety to prompt you to do things for me that I should be doing for myself. I need to take control of my life. Don't cover up or try to save me from the consequences of my drinking. It will only postpone the crisis, and perpetuate the illness.

Above all, don't run away from reality just because I do. The longer I continue to abuse alcohol, the worse things will get.

Start now to learn about and to plan for my recovery. I need help from a doctor, a counselor, a psychologist, a recovered or recovering alcohol abuser and from God.

Make me accountable. To ignore my drinking is the worst choice you can make.

 - Do you turn to chemicals to escape from worries or troubles?
 - Do you think or use drugs when you are alone?

 - Do you use chemicals to build your self-confidence?
 - Have you ever been in a hospital or institution because of chemical abuse?
