NODA LAUNCHES MENTOR PROGRAM

To further increase the value of organized dentistry to its members, the New Orleans Dental Association is forming a Mentor Program to increase the fellowship among dentists and to assist the new dentist to face the challenges of dentistry.

Each of us is aware of the pioneers in our profession who paved the way for dentistry to be the great profession it is today. Similarly, we can each reflect upon those individuals whom we consider to have influenced us the most with our career, our own special mentors.

In an effort to boost the value of membership in organized dentistry, we are actively recruiting dentists who wish to serve as mentors for new dentists trying to get their feet on the ground. The responsibilities of a mentor will include: (1) being available to meet or speak with the new dentist when he/she needs you; (2) making contact by phone or in person with the new dentist at least once per month; (3) inviting and accompanying the new dentist to NODA general membership meetings; (4) being able to attend occasional mentor meetings to discuss strategies for improving the mentor program.

Once the mentor is paired with a new dentist, they will be able to set their own parameters for the mentor relationship, which will be for a minimum period of 2 years.

Criteria to serve as a mentor include: (1) a strong interest and desire to commit one's time to this endeavor; (2) a member in good

standing in NODA for at least 5 years; (3) an enthusiastic opinion on the future of dentistry.

Once selected as a mentor, a questionnaire will be sent to you so that we may pair you with someone who possesses similar interests, practice location, specialty, practice structure, hobbies, etc.

■ COMMITTEES WORKING

Mona is ably assisted by Mrs. Alice Corkern. My sincere thanks to them both.

We have been able to help them a little in their work by finding some money in the budget to apgrade the computer system, so that some of the ongoing tasks should be a little easier in the future. They are both very pleased with the changes.

■ NODA IS SELECTED

One of the exciting things that has started to happen over the summer is that NODA has been selected as a component society to participate in the ADA Field Service Program for Dental Society Membership Recruitment and Retention

We have already had one meeting of the NODA Leadership and Membership Task Force, which was conducted by Ms. Michele Bresler Howard who is an ADA Field Services Manager. The ADA is providing all funding for the costs associated with Ms. Howard's travel expenses to and from New Orleans, and is also going to provide considerable funds for some of the new activities that we will initiate in our efforts to recruit and retain members.

Nationally, dentists do extremely well when it comes to membership in the ADA: 72.9% of dentists are members compared with 48% of physicians who belong to the AMA.

■ NODA HAS GOOD RECORD

We therefore have a strong political voice and the ADA has been able to exert some significant influence and has achieved some important benefits for all dentists such as the relaxation of the OSHA regulations.

Statistically, NODA seems pretty healthy with 71.8% membership (at the end of 1996). However, just one year earlier we had 74.4% membership, so we are going in the wrong direction!

Nationally, in the last five years, there have been losses in every age, sex, race and ethnic group, but they have been steepest among women, the young and minorities. We will address all groups, but also specifically target the areas of greatest loss.

We welcome the support of you, our current members, and encourage you to become involved. The next meeting of the Task Force will be on Wednesday, October 8, 1997. Let us know if you would like to come. Thanks to Dr. Kevin Collins for initiating these efforts, and to both Dr. Collins and Dr. Glenn Dubroc for instigating the Mentor program. More of this elsewhere in this issue.

One more important item of news: Dr. Tom Giacona was elected to serve Dr. Vince Liberto's unexpired term as the New Orleans area representative to the Louisiana State Board of Dentistry. New FDA labels on fluoride toothpastes overstate danger – ADA

The American Dental Association's Council on Scientific Affairs believes that one part of the warning now required on fluoride tooth-pastes by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) could unnecessarily frighten parents and children, and that the label greatly overstates any demonstrated or potential danger posed by fluoride toothpastes.

The label language, "If you accidentally swallow more than used for brushing, seek professional help or contact a poison control center immediately" is now required on all fluoride toothpastes. But the ADA, in a letter sent to the FDA last year, pointed out that a child could not absorb enough fluoride from toothpaste to cause a serious problem and that the excellent safety record on fluoride toothpaste argues against any unnecessary regulation.

Recent media coverage has focused attention on the safety of fluoride toothpastes, but the coverage has not revealed that the ADA limited the amount of fluoride allowed in ADA-Accepted toothpaste years ago for this reason.

In addition, back in 1991, the ADA began requiring that toothpaste manufacturers include the following language on all ADA-Accepted toothpastes: "Do not swallow. Use only a peasized amount for children under six. To prevent swallowing, children under six years of age should be supervised in the use of toothpaste." The new FDA labels are consistent with the ADA statements, with the exception of the poison control warning.

The ADA warning labels were required to help reduce the risk of mild fluorosis, which is a cosmetic defect noticeable as very light spots on permanent teeth and develops only while the teeth are still forming. Fluorosis only occurs when more than the optimal daily amount of fluoride is ingested.

Through its ADA Seal of Acceptance program, the toothpaste manufacturers must submit clinical data to the ADA in order to meet its guidelines on safety and effectiveness. Additionally, all products with the ADA Seal must submit the product's advertising and packaging for review so that consumers and dentists have assurance that the claims the product makes are supported by the clinical data.

New CDC guidelines on HIV exposure

Dr. James Briggs, Metairie member who is active in home care and nursing home dentistry and has developed and holds the patents for HIV home testing, calls attention to new CDC guidelines for fingerstick or exposure to HIV.

He cites an article in *Oral Care Report* which states: "It has been recommended that all dental care providers receive AZT prophylactically after high risk exposure to HIV."

The article states: "Importantly, receiving zidovudine (ZVD or AZT) after HIV exposure

provides protection reducing the risk of infection by about 79%."

Dr. Briggs writes: "The new guidelines state that in any meaningful exposure with needles, the situation be weighed and within 1-2 hours the healthcare provider should start AZT or some antiviral for 4 weeks."

"From what I surmise," writes Dr. Briggs, "in conversations with the CDC, future guidelines may state that those in risk of high exposure (dentists included) may want to keep a one day supply of AZT on hand to start immediately on exposure and then have the necessary RX filled."

"Exposures may well be a life or death decision – immediately – so all dentists should know of these new guidelines."

Oral Care Report stresses in its article that "every dental office should adopt a standard set of precautions based on the premise that all patients are potential carriers of a transmissible agent."

Orofacial pain subject of study

A recent study suggests the combination of diazepam and ibuprofen, or diazepam alone, is more efficacious than either ibuprofen or a placebo in the management of chronic orofacial muscle pain.

In the *Journal of Orofacial Pain*, Vol. 11 No. 2 1997, Elyse Singer, MD, and Raymond Dionne, DDS, PhD, report that Ibuprofen alone appeared to be ineffective in producing pain relief in the study sample.

Thirty-nine subjects with daily or near-daily orofacial pain of at least three months' duration participated. Patients were randomly allocated to one of four treatments: placebo, diazepam, ibuprofen, or the combination of diazepam and ibuprofen.

Singer and Dionne suggest the etiology of muscle pain may not be inflammatory in nature. The authors caution that the small sample size in the present study requires replication of their findings in a larger sample of patients.

Female dentist happy in her work

omen, a rarity in dentistry as recently as 10 years ago, are definitely blossoming out in the dental schools and in the profession.

Typical of the growing numbers of bright female practitioners is Dr. Stephanie Phillips who became an associate of Dr. Kathryn Sturm in the latter's strikingly attractive office at 6120 Magazine St. near Audubon Park.

In 1992 Dr. Phillips established her own practice in the same office while sharing overhead and a staff of 14. This year Dr. Sturm has taken on another female associate, Dr. Kathryn Philpott-Hill, as the progression goes on.

There were no dentists in Dr. Phillips' family, and she believes it was her admiration for her orthodontist, Dr. Ed Moise, that drew her towards the profession.

Her academic career began at Belmont Academy in Opelousas, moving on to LSU in Baton Rouge where she earned her associate degree in science and a BS in zoology. She entered the LSU School of Dentistry in 1985 and graduated in 1989.

Was being a woman an obstacle in the large dental school?

"I must say I was treated fairly at LSU," she says. "Some had warned me of, shall we say, a chauvinistic attitude. But truthfully I didn't find that. I liked all my professors."

Her views are borne out by the fact that she was elected president of the C. Edmund Kells Society and a member of Delta Sigma Delta. She also worked part-time at night as a tele-

phone operator at the dental school "where I was able to study," she adds.

Dr. Phillips is a general dentist. She has a special interest in endodontics, but "I enjoy all aspects of dentistry," she says. "It's very gratifying to be able to free people from pain or to improve their smile and, through that often their whole personalities."

"Dentistry is a great field for women," she says. "In contrast to medicine there is less oncall and emergency work, leaving more time for children and family."

In Dr. Phillips' case family includes her oneyear-old daughter Phoebe and a little sister or brother due in November.

Dr. Phillips' husband, Jim Fortenberry, is a sales representative for Bard Radiology, an international firm. Though busy folks, they have restored one uptown house and as the family grows are looking for a larger one. They are also antique buffs.

"I love working uptown because I love the historic architecture," says Dr. Phillips. Dr. Phillips belongs to the ADA, NODA, and LDA and is an associate on the staff of Touro Infirmary. She is also active in the New Orleans Dental Conference.


