DIRECT REIMBURSEMENT How dentists can get involved

ew educational materials produced by the ADA's PINSERV have been made available to constituent and component dental societies, as well as to member dentists. These are described below:

- A 12-page, four-color brochure, entitled, "Direct Reimbursement A Guide for the Dental Office," discusses the special role of the dental team in DR promotion. In a Q&A format, this brochure assists dentists and their staff in identifying the best DR prospects, provides suggestions for broaching the subject of DR and raises legal considerations. In addition, the brochure lists resources available to this audience and contains a glossary. Single free copies are available from the ADA, or may be ordered in bulk at 18 cents per copy.
- The Direct Reimbursement Marketing Manual, a comprehensive resource for dental societies, has been revised and updated. In a 3ring binder format, the manual offers information about a wide range of DR marketing and PR issues. The manual is being sent free-ofcharge to constituent societies and upon request to component societies.
- Two slide presentations have been created for educating audiences about the DR concept.
 One is intended for a dental society audience, the other for employer prospects. These presentations, which come with slides and a reading script, are available. The PowerPoint presentations also will be available on disk. Cost for these presentations has yet to be determined.

WHAT CAN DENTISTS DO?

The ADA's new brochure titled, "Direct Reimbursement – A Guide for the Dental Office," raises questions for dentists about the potential for their involvement with DR activities.

Dental societies may receive inquiries from dentists who wish to become more involved with educating employers in their communities about DR. If dentists choose to become active educators, they should be aware of the following key steps in this process:

- Become knowledgeable about DR. Develop a definition of the concept that is comfortable to convey to patients.
- Learn to identify patients who are unhappy with their current dental benefits plan. As always, support those with good plans.
- When appropriate, offer basic information about DR. This may include the ADA's brochure, "Direct Reimbursement The Dental Benefits Plan for Smart Companies," which features a business-reply card that can be sent to the ADA for more information.
- With patients' permission, put them in contact with a qualified DR broker or benefits consultant, their state dental society, or the ADA.
- Follow up to ensure that the patients' questions have been answered and their needs

In addition, some dentists may want to speak to community groups, such as Kiwanis or Knights of Columbus clubs – or they may submit press releases to local publications. As always, dentists should coordinate DR promotion efforts with their local dental society and consult with available legal counsel prior to embarking upon these efforts.

Dentist gives high marks to LSU course

LSU has a strong advocate for its "Continuum in Esthetic Dentistry" in Metairie dentist Grace Ferdinandsen.

"To study under and associate with the caliber of dentists they have and bring in for that program is a tremendous experience," says Dr. Ferdinandsen.

The young general dentist is relatively new to New Orleans-area practice but she's anything but a rookie dentist.



Is this the dental office of future?

Imagine having a computer disk with your entire dental history, including pictures of your teeth during various stages of your life and voice recordings of your dentist's treatment recommendations.

If Arun Nayyar, D.M.D., M.S. of Augusta, Georgia, has his way, that day will come sooner rather than later for most people. Dr. Nayyar gave four presentations on "Dental Technology and the Dental Office of the Future" at the ADA annual session in Washington, D.C.

"Communication is one of the most important things for a dentist to be skilled at, and many recent and future technological innovations seek to help dentists communicate better with their patients," he said.

Dr. Nayyar envisions a dental world in which dentists transcribe treatment plans into a voice-activated computer program that translates the information onto a computer disk. This can also be combined with an intraoral camera to add pictures of the patient's condition.

The computer disk allows patients to store this information and display it on their computer so that they can be more conversant with the dentist, who has always had this information close at hand.

Dr. Nayyar is also optimistic that CD-ROMs will eventually fill a big patient education need too. "CD-ROMs can take a patient through a question-and-answer session and address issues they may have before a procedure begins," he said.



Facts about ADA CERP

- The American Dental Association's Continuing Education Recognition Program (ADA CERP) has been in operation since 1993. ADA CERP evaluates and approves institutions and organizations that provide continuing dental education.
- Recognizing the need to offer its members and the dental community a way to select continuing education (CE) with confidence, the ADA started CERP in conjunction with a group of organizations representing the dental profession. ADA CERP is managed by a standing committee of the Council on Dental Education that includes representatives of the American Dental Association, the American Association of Dental Examiners, the American Association of Dental Schools, the Canadian Dental Association and the organizations representing the recognized dental specialties.
- ADA CERP evaluates providers in 14 aspects of program quality. Only CE providers that can meet CERP's standards and criteria are granted CERP approval and are authorized to use the CERP logo and/or approval statement on their publications. And once approved, CE providers are held accountable for maintaining those same high standards.
- ADA CERP does not approve the specific courses or the credit hours that recognized providers offer.
- Currently, there are over 350 CERP-recognized providers, including approximately 100 ADA constituent and component societies, 60 dental/medical schools and 50 national dental organizations. In addition, the ADA CERP Committee has authorized CERP-recognized

ADA constituent (state) dental societies to extend approval to their component (local) societies that offer CE courses primarily for their own members.

- Of the 43 licensing jurisdictions that have currently implemented CE requirements for licensure renewal of dentists, at least 35 accept the credits offered by ADA CERP-recognized providers toward their requirements. However, each licensing jurisdiction may have additional criteria that must be met.
- CE providers that are recognized by the national ADA CERP Committee are considered approved sponsors by the Academy of General Dentistry, and their courses are accepted for credit toward the FAGD and MAGD awards.
- All CE providers in the United States and Canada are eligible for ADA CERP approval, although this national-level recognition is probably most important for providers that offer their programs in more than one state. Currently, participating providers pay a \$300 application fee and \$200 annual fee.
- ADA CERP does not maintain a registry of CE credits. CERP's role is to evaluate providers and assist state boards and other organizations that have CE requirements to identify CE providers whose activities are acceptable for credit.
- As a relatively new program, ADA CERP is still evolving to meet the needs of the profession and to improve the quality of continuing dental education.

Find genetic marker indicating gum disease risk

For the first time, researchers have identified a genetic marker that they say increases a person's risk of developing severe gum disease by as much as sixfold, the Medical Tribune News Service reported.

Reporting their findings in the January issue of the *Journal of Clinical Periodontology*, researchers said that up to a third of the population may carry the marker, which is associated with increased inflammation, the news service indicated.

"The information may be used to develop a genetic test that would identify people at risk for gum disease," the article continued. "These people would be carefully monitored for early signs of gum disease and advised to keep their teeth and gums particularly clean."

In the study of 134 people with mild, moderate or severe gum disease, those with the most advanced disease were most likely to carry a variant of the IL-1B gene, the article concluded.

The ADA notes that some 80 percent of the general population has a prevalence for developing periodontal disease in some capacity. The advice to keep teeth and gums clean, the Association stresses, should not be reserved for only those who have a genetic marker for gum disease.

TMD links medicine, dentistry

Several studies reveal that temporomandibular disorders (TMD) and general health are associated.

Starting in 1992, Marjaana Kuttila, DDS; Seppo Kuttila, MD; Yrsa Le Bell, DDS, PhD; and Pentti Alanen, PhD, analyzed the relationship between need for treatment of temporomandibular disorders, sick leaves, and use of health care services in a study population of 441 adults.

The authors' findings, published in the *Journal of Orofacial Pain*, Vol. 11, No. 3, 1997, indicated these were strongly associated, suggesting that stomatognathic disorders are one link between medicine and dentistry in health care.

The study showed that subjects with TMD were on sick leave more often, visit physicians often, and use much medication, physiotherapy or massage. Limited awareness of the physician to diagnose and treat TMD often leads to unnecessary radiographs, antibiotics and pain medications.

The authors note that proper treatment for TMF patients would be referring the patient to a stomatognathically experienced dentist to minimize suffering and total cost.

The clear association between TMD treatment need and the use of health services emphasized the necessity of comparing different treatment modalities in chronic pain conditions in the head, neck and shoulder areas, conclude the authors.

FACTS ABOUT BONES

A person's peak bone density occurs in the early 30s. Between the ages of 11 and 30, one should get as much calcium and weight-bearing exercise as possible to help make sure bones are as dense as possible at age 30.

Kids over age 10 and young adults should get between 1,200 mg. and 1,500 mg. of calcium a day. Adults between 25 and 50 should aim for at least 1,000 mg. of calcium a day (1,200 during pregnancy). One cup of nonfat milk contains 300 mg. of calcium.

BABY BOTTLE DANGERS

The marketing of baby bottles decorated with name-brand soda pop, non-carbonated soft drinks and juice logos is a concern to health professionals who fear the logos will encourage parents to give children inappropriate beverages in baby bottles. Researchers reporting in the *Journal of Dentistry for Children* found that 53 percent of survey respondents owned baby bottles with soda, Kool-aid and/or juice logos.

MORE TEETH, MORE DISEASE?

A study of New England elders showed that those who retained higher numbers of teeth had more periodontal (gum) disease and dental cavities, and visited the dentist more often, according to a study in the *Journal of Public Health Dentistry*. This is the first time data have supported the "more teeth, more disease" theory, according to researchers of the Harvard School of Dental Medicine and the New England Research Institute, Boston.


