I am quite sure this year will be even better than last. So mark your calendar now and plan to attend.


DENTAL HYGIENE PROGRAM STARTS IN LAFAYETTE

LSUSD Dean Dr. Eric Hovland's office reports that the satellite dental hygiene program located in Lafayette has been fully funded by the LSU Medical Center.

This fall, four students will be accepted into the Lafayette dental hygiene program. It will be a two-year bachelor's program. Students will be trained at the Lafayette Community Health Care Clinic (clinical work/patient care), and also receive lectures via distance learning at the Louisiana National Guard Armory (next to the airport in Lafayette).

Prior to completion of a new building to house the program, four students will be the status quo. Plans are to graduate 8 (possibly 10) annually after the permanent facility is established.

Dental folks active in Special Olympics event

More than 70 volunteers from the LSU School of Dentistry and the greater New Orleans dental community in conjunction with Special Olympics, Special Smiles provided oral screenings and oral health education to 540 athletes during recent Special Olympics at Tulane University.

The screenings were crucial because they provided referrals and assessed oral status for those who don't receive regular care.

"It was obvious that some from rural parts of the state were in desperate need of dental care," said Claudia Cavallino, who had just finished her first year of dental school. "We saw a number of serious dental problems. We hope they follow through with the referrals we gave them."

Volunteers identified more than oral disease. "We took care of things that could become a problem," Dr. Frank Martello said. "For example, we identified a systemic problem that looked like mononucleosis in one athlete and referred him to his physician."

Besides providing a valuable health service to the athletes, SOSS introduced the special needs of this disabled population to the next generation of dental professionals. Participating in the screening helped to develop one's confidence, said Cavallino who, along with other first-year dental students, worked with either an upperclassman, LSUSD faculty member or private practitioner.

SOSS has several goals. It intends to raise dental professionals' awareness of the oral health concerns of those with special needs, including problems in receiving treatment, and to increase the number of dentists serving these patients. SOSS provides a list of regional dentists who care for those with special needs to all who participate in the Special Olympics, Special Smiles program.

Special Olympics, Colgate Oral Pharmaceuticals, and other organizations sponsor SOSS. The association was founded in 1993 by Dr. Steven Perlman of Boston University Goldman School of Dental Medicine. Since its inception, approximately 38,000 Special Olympics athletes have received SOSS services.

Miami Winter Meeting Jan. 27-29





"It was one of the best experiences I've ever had," Dr. Lacour recalls. "I figured if I could help people the way he helped me, this was what I wanted to do."


Born in El Paso where his dad was in the service, Kevin as a child moved with the family to Kenner where they spent 12 years before relocating to Destrehan.

Now, about those third molars . . .

Decisions on whether to extract third molars should be based on the most current scientific information and what is best for each individual patient, according to an article in the June 1999 American Journal of Orthodontics and Dentofacial Orthopedics.

Samir E. Bishara, DDS, MS, reviewed some of the pertinent studies related to the management of third molars in an orthodontic context. He contends that the approach to third molar management can be expressed in two extremes:


 Third molars should be removed even on a prophylactic basis, because they are frequently associated with future orthodontic and periodontal complications as well as other pathologic conditions; and 2) There is no scientific evidence of a cause-and-effect relationship between the presence of third molars and orthodontic and periodontal problems.

Bishara surveyed a group of 30 articles on third molar management, dating back to 1859. Based on the evidence in the literature, Bishara concluded that third molars play little or no role in lower incisor crowding and displacement, and that the only relationship between these two phenomena is that they occur at approximately the same stage of development (for example, adolescence and early adulthood).

As for potential impaction of third molars due to lack of space for their development or unfavorable inclination, Bishara suggests periodic evaluation of the teeth starting around age 8 or 9.

He cites a 1981 study which concluded that current techniques for predicting impaction and eruption are not sufficiently reliable to determine at an early age which third molars should be removed.

Bishara says that if approximately 20 to 25 percent of third molars become impacted, then 75 to 80 percent of removals are not justified. Along with the periodic evaluation of the molars, starting around 8 or 9, he suggests extraction for those with unfavorable inclination in development, infection, nonrestorable carious lesions, cysts, tumors, and destruction of adjacent teeth and bone.
