

Looking Back

How Dentistry Has Changed

NODA continues a series of reflections of seasoned dentists on changes in the profession.

On reflecting on how our profession has changed since graduating from Loyola Dental School in 1966, I feel that flouridation of our water supply has had the greatest effect on the practice of dentistry.

Most of the patients that I examined in the late 60s and early 70s had restoration in their first molars and most of their primary teeth. If a 10-year-old has fillings in his mouth today, the chances are very good that he or she has some developmental enamel defects or drinks bottled water. I've found that, in speaking with patients and parents, invariably these kids are drinking bottled water. Apparently, the fluoride content is not optimized.

The next major change has been the continual development of the dental materials that are used in all areas of dentistry. Impression materials, adhesives, and restorative materials have improved dramatically. In turn, this has led to more of an emphasis on cosmetic dentistry.

In my area of practice these changes in materials have allowed us to treat orthodontic patients more comfortably and in less time. It's hard to explain to an orthodontic resident what it was like to fit and cement an orthodontic band around every tooth — unless he or she was the recipient of that kind of case.

Additionally, orthodontic wires today are more flexible and long-lasting. Patients don't receive a big "jolt" from the activation of their appliances. Appointments are shorter and farther apart, as long as good oral hygiene is maintained.

Flouridation and better dental materials have together allowed dentists to concentrate more on making teeth look better as well as function better. Older patients are becoming aware of the fact that they can be more attractive with dental care.

Teeth can be straightened (with veneers or braces) and lightened, Supporting tissues can be augmented, implants placed, and periodontal health maintained.

There is a change that has taken place within our profession that is disturbing. Thirty-five years ago, over 90% of practicing dentists belonged to organized dentistry. As one who has been active in organized dentistry for many

years, I am worried about the future of our profession.

Twenty-five percent of practicing dentists do not belong to the ADA. We really do run the risk of becoming a fragmented profession. A fragmented profession has no clout and lessened credibility.

We also face the problem of fewer members willing to serve as leaders. And those that do will only agree to do so for a limited period of time. (This is a problem that all organizations face.)

I'd like to finish this article by making a plea to get involved in NODA activities. The renewal forms will be mailed before long. Sign up for a committee and call a colleague and offer a ride to the next NODA meeting.

Dr. Toso, a past president of NODA and LDA, has held a number of positions in the ADA, including chairman of the ADA insurance council and 15 years as a delegate to the national body.



Speaking of food: Zap with care

If you've been hoarding old margarine tubs to use in your microwave, toss them out. Stick to glass and glass ceramic cookware or containers labeled for microwave use, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food Safety and Inspection Service.

Don't use polystyrene (clear) or Styrofoam takeout boxes to reheat food: These containers can warp or melt in the microwave, causing chemicals to seep into foods.

For microwave wraps, use: wax paper, oven cooking bags, parchment paper, white paper towels to cover foods, or plastic wraps (but make sure they don't touch foods during cooking).

Never use thin plastic storage bags, brown grocery bags or newspapers in the microwave Source: Health Quest, newsletter of the Mayo Clinic, May 2000.
